


About this report

This report compiles data on Employment Generated in Telangana from Apr-Sep¹ 2023 (current year) and compares data for the preceding financial years 2021-22 and 2022-23 for the same time period. The analysis relies on information downloaded from https://nrega.nic.in/ as of 06-10-2023. Our aim is to provide citizens and stakeholders with insights into the present status of MGNREGA implementation in Telangana.



April to September

1. Key Statistics

The following table displays some important statistics for Telangana in comparison to the rest of the country for the period Apr-Sep 2023.

2. Employment at State Level

2.1 Analysis of Households participation

The employment scenario under the Mahatma Gandhi National Rural Employment Guarantee Act (MGN-REGA) for the fiscal year 2023-24 reveals a discernible decline both at the national level and specifically in Telangana compared to the preceding year. As of October 6, 2023, the number of jobcards issued witnessed an 8.0% decrease, dropping from 57.5 lakhs in the fiscal year 2022-23 to 52.92 lakhs in current year in Telangana. This is lower than the decline at the national level, where the decline in the number of issued jobcards is at 12.3%. However, the total number of active jobcards experienced a 5.4% reduction in Telangana, decreasing from 37.3 lakhs to 35.28 lakhs, higher than the decline at the national level at 4.3%. Furthermore, the overall number of active workers in the program saw a notable decline of 9.7% in Telangana, declining from 67.3 lakhs in the previous fiscal year to 60.77 lakhs as of October 6, 2023 whereas the decline nationally is significantly lower at 7.5%. These statistics indicate a significant contraction in the MGNREGA workforce, emphasizing the need for a comprehensive analysis to identify the factors contributing to this decline and to formulate strategies for revitalizing the program's participation.

2.1.1 Worker Deletions

In the fiscal year 2022-23, a considerable number of workers faced deletions from jobcards nationwide. As per the Ministry of Rural Development's response in Lok Sabha, the total tally of worker deletions amounted to 5.2 crores. Telangana experienced a significant impact, with approximately 17.3⁷ lakh workers being deleted during the same period. Despite extensive media coverage exposing the unjust nature of these deletions in Telangana⁸, one would expect the state to implement corrective measures to reinstate affected workers in the current fiscal year. However, data indicates that no significant shift has occurred, as the number of new workers added and deleted remains relatively unchanged this year. From Apr to Sep 2023-24, the program saw an addition of 134,487 workers. Nevertheless, the subsequent deletion of 120,281 workers during these six months resulted in a net increase of 14,206 workers overall(0.1%). This suggests that the fate of all genuine workers among the 17.3 lakh affected individuals hangs in the balance. (For detailed District level net deletions data please refer to Annexure 2).

2.2 Comprehensive Analysis of Employment Metrics and Trends

17.9% dip in persondays generated in FY 2023-24 when compared to the same period in FY 2022-23.

Ideally, MGNREGA, as a demand-driven employment program, should align with the workers' demand, evident in the number of Households employed and workdays generated. However, the central government's stringent control over budget allocations and states' varying political will and administrative capacities highlight the significance of employment-related figures as vital indicators of NREGA effectiveness. Evaluating MGNREGA employment performance involves considering metrics such as Number of Households employed, participation of vulnerable Households, average persondays of employment generated and number of Households completing 100 days.

Telangana MGNREGA Performance (Apr-Sep 2023-24):

• **Persondays Decline:** MGNREGA workers in Telangana generated 8.14 crore persondays, marking a 17.9% decrease from the previous year's 9.92 crore persondays. This decline becomes more significant when contrasted with the 29.3% drop from FY 2021-22, where 11.52 crore persondays were generated.

National Perspective: (Refer Table 3)

- **Nationwide Employment Trends:** On a national level, there is a 15.9% increase in the number of Households employed in FY 2023-24 compared to the same period in 2022-23.
- **Overall Persondays Uptick:** Nationally, there is a 13.5% increase in persondays generated compared to FY 2022-23.

Contrast and Attention Call:

• **Unique Telangana Scenario:** The contrasting trends between Telangana's decline and the national upsurge in persondays generated suggest a noteworthy situation that demands the attention of the state government.

Number of Households Worked and Persondays Generated in the last three years




Figure 1: Employment Trends (Apr-Sep Yearly Comparison) at State Level.

2.3 Employment at District Level




Figure 2: District-wise persondays comparison of Apr-Sep 2023-24 and Apr-Sep 2022-23

In comparison to Apr-Sep 2022-23, only three districts (Jagityal, Nalgonda, Sangareddy) had an increase in the number of persondays created, while the remaining 29 of the 32 districts saw a loss in Apr-Sep 2023-24. Figure 2 illustrates trends by district.

As shown in figure 2, the biggest drops were observed in Mulugu (51.2%), Medchal (51.1%), and Kamareddy (47.5%), while Sangareddy (14.4%) experienced the highest rise.

2.4 Employment Trend in Apr-Sep 2023-24 for Different Categories of Workers

While there is a decrease in MGNREGA participation at the state level this year compared to last year, the SC, ST, and Other categories also show a similar pattern. The 'Others' group had the highest rate of persondays reduction (18.9%), followed by the ST group (16.6%) and the SC group (16.5%).

Table 4 shows the persondays generated and percentage decrease for the three categories over the last two fiscal years for the same time period.

In the fiscal year 2023-24, the data on persondays generated under the Mahatma Gandhi National Rural Employment Guarantee Act (MGNREGA) reveals notable shifts in the engagement of different worker groups. A significant observation is the overall decline in persondays by 17.9% compared to the preceding fiscal year. Specifically, Scheduled Caste (SC) workers contributed 176.93 lakh persondays, reflecting a 16.5% reduction from the previous year. Similarly, Scheduled Tribe (ST) workers generated 170.64 lakh persondays, experiencing a 16.6% drop. The category labelled as 'Others' witnessed a substantial decrease of 18.9%, accounting for 466.79 lakh persondays. These figures indicate a widespread decline in MGNREGA participation across various demographic groups, warranting a closer examination of the factors contributing to this notable decrease in persondays.

3. Conclusion

In conclusion, the analysis of the Mahatma Gandhi National Rural Employment Guarantee Act (MGNREGA) implementation in Telangana for the fiscal year 2023-24 reveals a concerning trend of significant declines in key indicators. The reduction in the number of jobcards issued by 8.0%, active jobcards by 5.4%, and active workers by 9.7% underscores the challenges faced by the program. This contraction in the MGNREGA workforce, both at the national level and specifically in Telangana, necessitates urgent attention and strategic interventions.

The report also highlights a substantial 17.9% dip in persondays generated at the state level in FY 2023-24 compared to the same period in FY 2022-23. This decline is more pronounced when compared to FY 2021-22, marking a substantial drop of around 29.3%. The district-level analysis further illustrates the challenges, with the majority of districts experiencing a loss in persondays, particularly in Mulugu, Medchal, and Kamareddy.

Examining different categories of workers reveals a consistent pattern of decline, with different social groups experiencing personday reduction. The overall decline in persondays across various demographic groups underscores the need for a deeper examination of contributing factors.

In essence, this report serves as a call to action, urging policymakers and stakeholders to collaboratively address the multifaceted challenges faced by the MGNREGA program in Telangana. The decline in employment indicators emphasizes the importance of strategic interventions and a comprehensive approach to revitalize the program, ensuring its effectiveness in providing livelihood support to the vulnerable sections of society. The report also raises concerns about net deletions in the previous fiscal year, with a substantial number of workers being deleted from jobcards, necessitating corrective measures for reinstatement in the current fiscal year.
